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By Relaxing Visa Policies, Mekong Countries Are Preparing for Surge in Tourists Around the Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS), governments are implementing visa relaxation policies – all to the benefit of incoming tourists, who appreciate the lowered barriers and come in greater numbers as a result.

Consider China PR, which has resumed and expanded its <u>144 - hour visa - free transit policy</u> to additional ports, making it easier for travelers from 54 countries to visit.

Thailand, for its part, has <u>extended visa stays</u> to stimulate its economy, effective from 15 July, 2024. Meanwhile, Lao PDR has <u>eased its visa policies</u> to attract more international visitors, while <u>Myanmar has</u> <u>lifted the last of its COVID - era restrictions.</u>

By simplifying visa procedures and extending the duration of stays, GMS tourism authorities are fostering a more accessible and welcoming environment for tourists, in turn setting the stage for a higher volume of international travelers.

These proactive measures represent a collective effort across GMS borders that not only strengthen regional cooperation, but also promotes the sustainable growth of tourism in the Mekong region, contributing to economic development and cultural exchange.

2 - 4 August

Amazing Beach Life Festival, Thailand.

As August kicks off, this beach festival starts its Phuket leg at Patong Beach between 2-4 August, with activities like water sports, music concerts by famous Thai artists, and DIY workshops such as beach paintings on wooden trays and key chains. 12 - 19 August

Taungpyone Festival, Myanmar.

This festival commemorates two brothers that are venerated as Nat spirits. Held at Taung Pyone village north of Mandalay, the festival sees the whole village transformed into bazaars hawking food, flowers, toys, clothing, and trinkets; food stalls selling traditional Burmese fare; and theaters for Burmese traditional drama. Vu Lan Festival, Viet Nam.

In Taoist tradition, August is Ghost Month, when the world of the spirits is more open to humans. Vu Lan, or the filial piety ceremony, pays special tribute to ancestors and family. Locals visit their neighborhood temples to make offerings in honor of their ancestors. In Hoi An, local custom is to light small lanterns for our loved ones and set them afloat on the Hoài River.
